Writing to Persuade

In your English exam you will be expected to write persuasively. You have about one hour to plan, write and check two sides of A4 in answer to your chosen question.

Example Question

You have been employed by a school to produce an article for a newsletter, persuading parents to contribute money to the school to improve facilities for students.

TASK 1 Planning

Draw a table in your book like the one below. In the first column, list 8 to 10 things which would be improved if parental contributions were made. In the second column, give good reasons for these improvements which will convince a parent. Also give reasons why these improvements will not happen if parents do not pay for them.

Improvements	Reasons
50 new computers to be purchased and placed in a variety of subject classrooms.	The school has already spent money allocated for new computers (30 already bought). More are needed to enable subjects such as History, Geography and English to extend use of ICT.

Organise these ideas into a logical order, putting a number next to each one.

TASK 3 Starting the article

Write a headline and subheading, and lead paragraph which grab attention and start to persuade parents of the need for voluntary contributions.

TASK 4 Main body of article

Now write up the ideas from your table, writing a detailed paragraph on each one.

Checklist

- Make sure you describe possible improvements and how the money will be used in full.
- ✓ Always give good reasons for extra money being needed (ones which will convince parents).
- ✓ Keep your writing style formal and polite.
- \checkmark Write in paragraphs one for each different idea.
- ✓ Use subheadings, pull quotes and bullet point lists to focus the reader's attention.

TASK 5 Finishing the article

Your last paragraph should sum up your main points and tell parents what to do next if they wish to contribute money. End by thanking the reader.

TASK 6 Proof reading

Spend a few minutes reading through your whole article. Check for incorrect spelling, missing words, and a lack of paragraphing.
